March Madness: Busted Brackets and Empty Tombs

Dear Friends,

Alleluia, Christ is Risen!

The grocery stores are already heavily discounting chocolate bunnies and moving on to their next "seasonal display" (Derby, at least in Kentucky). But we in the church know that Easter is a season, not a day, and that this season lasts for 50 days. So, I send along to you a heartfelt "Happy Easter!"

For fans of a certain university's men's basketball team, March did not go as planned, and April couldn't come soon enough. Across the country, the trendy pick to make the Final Four (at least) got upset in the first round of play. Losses like that hurt. They just do. We may say it's only a game, we might try our best to be good sports, to put things in perspective... but it still hurts.

College basketball is not war. It's not life and death. In a certain sense, the outcome of an amateur athletic completion played by young men, several of whom will soon be millionaires, may seem rather trivial. But a lot of people did react with sadness and disappointment. Of course, others are overjoyed (and still others apathetic). But I don't serve a church next door to Oakland University. I serve here in Lexington, where you can make small talk about Coach Cal as easily as the weather.

And let's be honest: the disappointment and the frustration are real. In our culture, we have the crazy idea that our emotions need permission. I can't tell you how many times I have heard someone clearly hurting at a funeral say something like, "I'm not family, but..." Ok. Maybe you're not a blood relative... but your grief is real. And valid.

And then there are times when people feel there's something "wrong" with how they are feeling. I think about caregivers, those saints who honor their parents or uphold their marriage vows, spending years taking care of a gravely ill loved one. And when it is all over, and a sense of relief comes over them, sometimes people ask: is it bad that I feel this way?

No, it's not. It's not bad. It's human. And if you are reading this, I am guessing that you're human. And humans feel things whether we give ourselves permission or not. Jesus certainly did. That is part the of the wonder and beauty and mystery of the Incarnation. The center of our faith is the belief that Jesus of Nazareth was not only fully God, but that he was fully human too.

Think about when Jesus goes to the temple and sees money lenders exploiting the people for profit, and he gets angry and drives them out. Anger is not a bad emotion. It's a human one. Likewise, when his friend Lazarus dies, Jesus weeps for his friend. Grief and sadness are not bad emotions, they are human emotions. [Side note: a pox on any pastor who tells people not to cry at funerals!] If the savior of the world can be angry, sad, disappointed, tired, anxious, thirsty or in need of a nap, well what kind of permission would the rest of us need to feel the same?

On Good Friday, Jesus cries out in agony from the cross, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" Jesus speaks as a man utterly scorned. He's exhausted and humiliated and alone. Those are real feelings. And chances are, as you go through life, you will find yourself calling out in pain too. Part of being human is that our feelings do not need permission. We feel what we feel. It is true for Jesus, and it is true for us.

Sometimes people share their vulnerabilities with an addendum. Something like, "I'm not looking for sympathy." Well, maybe not, but you wouldn't be wrong to seek it. Aren't we all in this together? If imagining the cross can break our hearts, why wouldn't the pain of our sisters and brothers move us to compassion? If Jesus did not silently bear his pain, why on earth would you expect yourself to do just that? How could anyone expect that of you?

We can talk about taking responsibility for those feelings and stewarding them another time [Sidenote: the next Healthy Congregations workshop is coming in May]. For now, it is enough to remember that emotions are not "good" or "bad;" they are human. And as human beings, as the people of God, individuals capable of feeling love and hate, anger and peace, jealousy and admiration, greed and contentment, depression and jubilation, all the feelings, let's talk about how we feel about this thing we call the resurrection.

Viewed objectively, the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ is the best news ever uttered in human history. The empty tomb is a sign for all of us that our destiny is not a moldering grave or an eternity among the dead. It's life eternal with and through Jesus Christ. This has been a source of comfort and strength for countless Christians throughout the ages.

But we can say with conviction that the tomb is empty, that death has been defeated, and that Christ has risen, without saying anything about how we feel about these things. So how do you feel about it? If you are willing, I would love to hear your reflections on Easter. Send me an email. Let's find a time to grab coffee. How have you experienced the resurrection recently?


My own experience of the church is that we often treat Easter like a kind of pep rally and the resurrection like a cheer. Looking at scripture, though, makes it evident that the first disciples on the first Easter felt an incredible range of feelings. Fear, disbelief, amazement, wonder, hope, doubt, relief. My guess is, especially over the entire season, there will be times when we feel some of these things too. Easter isn't one endless pep rally. And the resurrection is more than a slogan to rally the crowd.

Therefore, my hope for this season, these 50 days of Easter, is that we ponder and pray about being the very human followers of Jesus, fully God and fully human. That we strive to be community of love and compassion, a place where people are allowed to express vulnerability and doubt, and not have to seek permission for feeling as they do. A place where one can indeed sing with joy about the empty tomb, and still be sad that their bracket is busted. That's not silly, it's human.








God's Pantry

Dear brothers and sisters,

I am writing to you with heartfelt gratitude towards the congregation. It all began back in 2009 when a group of missionaries, including Pastor Ron Luckey and my grandma Patricia Mundt, arrived through CFI (Christian Flights International).

Although our initial intention was to visit people and share the love of God, we unexpectedly found ourselves hiking in the hills. Despite this unforeseen challenge, I eagerly supported my grandma aka Patricia Mundt in navigating the terrain.

As I approached the end of high school, I took a chance and asked if assistance could be provided for me to attend college. Pastor Ron then entrusted this responsibility to Patricia.

Following my schooling, and with plans to study in the US, Pastor Ron, Patricia, and Sherri, along with the church, ensured that we (the four of us) had a place to live, food on the table, and even helped with necessities such as charging our phones with minutes (courtesy of Linda Kinney), as we were unable to secure employment. I am deeply grateful for your generosity.

Despite several unsuccessful attempts to secure study opportunities in the US, we began university in Haiti, thanks to your unwavering support.

In 2015, I arrived in Lexington after finally gaining entry to the US for an observership in Le Mars, Iowa. Steve Kinney drove from Indianapolis to Lexington to welcome me. As I crossed the Ohio bridge and saw the sign welcoming me to Kentucky, I felt as though I had found a second home.

During my time in Lexington, the church arranged for me to give a presentation. Dr. Jimmy and Cortney Lee were in attendance and graciously invited me to shadow them. It was during this period, while observing Dr. Cortney Lee's work, that I developed a fondness for country music. The University of Kentucky became a dream for me, and I returned each summer to shadow US physicians.

Once again, this year, the church supported me immensely during the residency application season, both financially and spiritually.

On March 15th, I received the wonderful news that I had matched in Radiology at the University of Kentucky.

I conclude with Psalm 113:7-9: "He raises the poor out of the dust, and lifts the needy out of the ash heap, that He may seat him with princes— with the princes of His people. He grants the barren woman a home, like a joy-ful mother of children. Praise the LORD!"

I am eternally grateful and believe that God will bless each one of you abundantly. I cannot thank you enough.
