Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, 2 looking to Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God. (Hebrews 12:1-2)

The 20th of April is a day noted for controversy and tragedy. As the birthday of Adolf Hitler, 4/20 carries historical weight and continues to be commemorated within neo-Nazi circles. It is likely this association played a role in the perpetrators of the Columbine school shooting selecting this day to carry out their horrible attack in 1999. For years afterward, schools were often on alert and experienced an uptick in threats each April. Compared to those associations, the connection between 4/20 and the slang term for marijuana (420) is relatively benign.

Hitler. School shootings. Pot. Easter?

An underappreciated quality of Easter Sunday is that it moves around on the calendar each year. The last time Easter was on 4/20 was 2003. The next time will be 2087, provided that the church does not come together on an agreement on how to set the date before then (this year, the western and eastern branches of Christianity will celebrate on the same day, however next year they will be a week apart). This means that Easter lands on dates between March 22nd and April 25th (or April 4th and May 8th for the Orthodox). Other major holidays are anchored to a set date, but Easter moves around.

This untamed quality of Easter is a reminder that God has truly overcome this world. "A day of controversy and tragedy?" God says, "How about an empty tomb and a resurrected Messiah?" There is no corner of this world that God does not love. There is no day that Christ- the alpha and the omega, the beginning and the end, who is the same yesterday, today, and forever- does not redeem. In our tragedies and our controversies, God's mercy and justice are revealed.

As we journey together towards Easter, in the midst of the turmoil of life, we travel knowing that Christ's Easter victory has put sin and death under his feet. This is not only a comfort to us on an individual level (knowing that our own sins are forgiven) but also that all sin has been overcome. This includes the brokenness we have inflicted on the natural world (the Deep Water Horizon Oil spill began on 4/20/10). With our eyes fixed on Jesus, we know that no controversy or tragedy can overshadow the glory of his resurrection.

Update on Haiti

In 2009, Faith Lutheran Church began a ministry to Haiti. Since you have been on this journey with us, we want to update you on the plight of our Haitian loved ones here in the United States.

Our Haitian men have received notice that their Temporary Protective Status (TPS) will be revoked as of August 3, 2025. Their status will flip from **LEGAL** to **ILLEGAL** on this date and they are subject to deportation. These men have been legal, fully documented, working, in the middle of residencies, etc. They are <u>not</u> criminals and have done nothing wrong.

Please pray for each of our men and their loved ones during this traumatic time. Some of you have asked about donating to help with incurring costs such as paperwork, immigration attorney fees, etc. To donate make your checks payable to Faith Lutheran Church and write Haitian Refugee in the memo line.

On March 16th or 3/16, we were reminded of John 3:16...For God so loved THE WORLD that He gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

April's Deep Green Forum will be:


Thursday, April 10, 2025, 7 pm *God Works in Mysterious Ways*Ray Hughes

The Marks of a Healthy Congregation

On March 15th Faith hosted the final Healthy Congregations workshop. This series of workshops was thought provoking as well as eye opening. We would like to thank Kevin Burney for leading these workshops as well as the Parish Life Committee for providing breakfast at each workshop.

The New Testament speaks of the church as a living system -"the body of Christ." The apostle Paul makes it clear that the "body of Christ" is a whole comprised of many parts, yet functioning as one. The various members and services of a congregation interact, much as do the cells and organs of the human body with the ongoing interplay of blood circulation, nerve endings, chemical messages, and energy sources. The mark of organic life is the continuing struggle of balance and imbalance. If balance fails, there is sickness. Gross imbalance spells death. Health, therefore, is the drive for life, what an organism does to preserve itself, how it responds to challenges to its integrity, and how it adapts to changes. The same is true for the congregation. Its health is its response.

What responses create health in congregations? What kind of interactions and relationships happen in healthy churches? What type of functioning advances, rather than impedes, the mission of the church in the local congregation? Health is a multidimensional phenomenon. The following statements describe some of the most important health- promoting responses.

- Healthy congregations accept differences (rather than deny them)
- Healthy congregations focus on their strengths (rather than weaknesses)
- Healthy congregations focus on mission (rather than "getting along," the past, survival, "the minister," or some other thing or issue)
- Healthy congregations respond to anxiety and change (instead of reacting)
- Healthy congregations manage conflict (instead of denying it)
- Healthy congregations act flexibly and creatively (instead of rigidly)
- In healthy congregations, leaders promote health through their presence and functioning (instead of techniques or skills)
- In healthy congregations, leaders challenge people (instead of comforting them)
- In healthy congregations, leaders provide immune capacities (instead of enabling disease processes)
- In healthy congregations, people respond graciously and truthfully (rather than judgmentally or secretively),
- In healthy congregations, people develop caring relationships (rather than willful transactions)
- In healthy congregations, people empower others (rather than dominate them or cure them)
- Healthy congregations recognize the Creator's interdependent design of life (rather than isolated, unrelated parts)
- Healthy congregations practice stewardship gratefully and willingly (rather than begrudgingly)
- Healthy congregations combine money and the Christian Life (rather than separate one from the other)
- In healthy congregations, people share their lives (instead of each living for oneself)
- In healthy congregations, hospitality is offered to all (instead of favoritism for the few or like-minded)
- In healthy congregations, beginning again is a way of life (instead of staying stuck)
